In continuing the theme of the St. Andrews community being one of family that Mackay describes above, we want to share with you some reflections on loss, life, love, death and the friendships that the St. Andrews community seems to have engendered in us all.

This past January, St. Andrews lost **Trae Brookins '95**, a close friend to many of his generation, but also an individual whose friendships with other "St. Androids" spanned several decades, and whose influence was felt by a great number of people. **Jed Koball '95** has written the meditation below. It is appropriate to share not only in the loss of Trae, but because it expresses the strong ties that bind so many of us in lifelong friendships:

Trae Brookins was my best friend for almost 25 years. I'm certain many would rightfully say he was their best friend, too. Trae passed away peacefully this afternoon following a long and dignified battle with cancer. He was 41 years old.

Trae and I shared a dorm room together for three years at St. Andrews Presbyterian College. Many of our friends from SA have written incredibly touching words about Trae in recent weeks and shared hilarious and heartfelt stories of our misadventures in growing up together in college. I could not be more grateful for this community - for the love they share for Trae, with his incredible wife Rebecca Stacy, and with one another.

I was fortunate to have been able to spend a few days with Trae and Rebecca just before Christmas, upon learning that his situation had taken a sudden turn for the worse. Like always, we laughed a lot. Words were often not needed; we just knew (as roommates and friends often do) that there was something (or someone) worth laughing about in the world. After nearly 25 years of friendship, together we had failed to fully mature, and it

was wonderful. Even in his pain and suffering, he brought me great joy.

Nonetheless, it is a helluva way to end a year and begin another -- pondering life and death, accepting loss. I consider all I encountered this past year and all that is laid out before me in the year ahead, and I wonder what it is that defines me, us. There will be projects to finish, pounds to lose, miles to run, money to raise, causes to promote, meetings to organize, presentations to give, laws to advocate for, books to read, subjects to study, news to catch up on, letters to write, dinners to prepare, parties to host...all of which will shape what lies ahead, but none of which (successful or not) will define who I am, who we are.

Right now I feel like RENT, the great Broadway show of my generation, sings best what is on my heart: "How do you measure a year in the life? How about love?" In the end and through it all, it will be about friends, and husbands and wives and partners and even perfect strangers, all of whom form our communities, our circles... accompanying one another through hurt, celebrating in the joy, laughing at the ridiculous, crying when it feels like the right thing to do, shouting out when it is the only thing to do. For nearly 25 years, Trae, this is what is has been about. In my rather nomadic life, you have been a constant. This is what has defined us...all of us. And it always will.

Love.

My dear friend and brother, in the deep sadness of your death, you have given me new life. Thank you. May the love you shared with us all live in us and through us and among us now and forever.

Kathy Gallucci, niece of **Kay McClanahan '67**, donated a framed picture and a pottery bowl made by **Richard McCord '65**.


Randy Wolfe '69 donated 12 books to the Library.

A much-beloved member of the Class of '95, Trae Brookins took generous delight in developing friendships with St. Andrews alumni across the decades. His affection for four-legged creatures, both dogs and cats, that he and his wife Rebecca Stacy '96 rescued, his sonorous voice, his taste for fine coffee and love of Star Trek and Kurt Vonnegut are just a few of Trae's memorable characteristics. However, one of Trae's most consistently distinguishing traits was that he was always among the most snappily dressed person in any room, and was usually wearing a bow tie.

Trae lost his battle to cancer on January 4th, 2015, leaving a tremendous hole in the world, but especially in the St. Andrews community—not only for the ones who loved and knew him well, but also those who never got the pleasure of his acquaintance. Trae served as an ambassador to prospective students, both while a student and beyond graduation. He worked for two years as Associate Director of Admissions, and was a regular at Alumni Weekend, staying in touch with alumni across multiple graduating classes year after year. He exemplified the unique intellectual spirit of the ideal St. Andrews graduate every day of his life, sharing its spark with everyone he encountered.

To both celebrate our unparalleled peer, and to stand in solidarity with the uniquely exceptional school that has molded and strengthened all our spirits, Leslie Leaf '95 and Laurie Quartermain Nederveen '93 have commissioned the Trae Bow bow tie, patterned after the St. Andrews tartan, with a custom "Trae Bow" label sewn on the inside. These limited edition ties are available for purchase at \$75, with proceeds benefitting a campus improvement project in Trae's honor.

Trae gave his abundant spirit to St. Andrews with love and enthusiasm, and represented the core values of our school wherever he went. While he is no longer with us, this memorial presents an opportunity for any and all to participate in an ongoing celebration of not simply Trae's spirit, but the exceptional one of St. Andrews, as well.
