THE SYLVIA SMITH LANG SCHOLARSHIP:

A Wonderful Way to Continue the Spirit of Giving at St. Andrews

In December, 2013 Dr. C. Max Lang endowed St. Andrews with \$50,000 to fund a scholarship in his wife's memory. Sylvia Smith Lang was a member of the Class of 1962, the first graduating class of St. Andrews. She spent the first three years of her college career at Flora Macdonald. A native of Ellerbe, NC, Mrs. Lang lived with her husband in Hummelstown, PA. She died in June, 2010.

This scholarship will be awarded yearly to an incoming student who exhibits a sound scholastic record as evidenced by ranking in the top 25% of the recipient's high school and/or university class and will also be based on financial need.

At St. Andrews, Sylvia served on the Granville Dorm Council; she was a member of the Highland Players during her years at both Flora Mac and St. Andrews. (See the article about the history of the Highland Players on page 6.)

Sylvia's future husband, Dr. Max Lang, entered veterinary school in 1957. In his fourth year, he received a draft notice. Although he received a deferment, Dr. Lang says, "A lady at the draft board said, the day you graduate, you'll get another notice. Seeing the handwriting on the wall, I applied for a commission in both the Air Force and Army." He received commissions in both, but chose the Army. He received orders to go to the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research in Washington, D.C., his first exposure to laboratory animal medicine. ... Cont'd on page 3



The 2014 Fortner-Ragan Awards

The 2014 Fortner-Ragan Awards were presented at St. Andrews University on February 20. Created in 1986 to honor Ethel N. Fortner, who was a friend to writers and a frequent contributor to the *St. Andrews Review*, the Fortner Award has been given to ardent supporters of the arts in communities ranging from journalists to activists to publishers. This year's Fortner award recipient was Elizabeth Hudson, the editor-in-chief of *Our State Magazine*.

A native North Carolinian, Hudson began her publishing career in 1997 at *Our State Magazine* answering phones in the circulation department before moving to the editorial department. She held various positions before becoming the editor-in-chief in 2009.

Under her leadership, the magazine's paid circulation has increased more than 30 percent. In 2011 and 2012, *Our State* won Gold Eddies for "Best Issue," of a regional magazine in the country, a top honor from *FOLIO: Magazine*, the magazine industry's leading publication recognizing editorial excellence.

Wish you were here: A Collection of Essays from the editor of Our State Magazine was published in 2013 to highlight Hudson's essay style as seen in the editor's note found in each issue of the magazine.

Rhiannon Giddens, co-founding member of Grammy Award-winning country, blues and old-time music trio Carolina Chocolate Drops, was presented the 2014 Sam Ragan Fine Arts Award from St. Andrews University. The Sam Ragan Award was created in 1981 to honor Samuel Talmadge Ragan, North Carolina's first Secretary of Cultural Resources. For 20 years, Ragan edited the *News & Observer* in Raleigh, and was owner and editor of *The Pilot* in Southern Pines until his death in 1996. Sam Ragan also authored six award-winning volumes of poetry as well as works of non-fiction. The Ragan Award is presented annually to an individual for outstanding contributions to the Fine Arts in North Carolina.

A Greensboro native, Giddens sang with family in her youth, but initially planned to be a quantum physicist. She attended the North Carolina School of Science and Math before a senior year trip to choral camp convinced her that music was her true calling. She subsequently attended the Oberlin Conservatory of Music and the music school at the University of North Carolina Greensboro. There she performed as a lyric coloratura soprano. It was during a break from that work that she discovered the banjo.

Folklorist and singer Margaret Bennett describes Giddens as "a showstopper—not only for her glorious voice but also for her incredible versatility. She ranges across many styles and genres, and is equally at ease signing opera, blues, gospel and Gaelic or whatever the moment takes."

In 2013, Giddens was part of the lineup for "Another Day, Another Time: Celebrating the Music of *Inside Llewyn Davis*", a special concert event at in New York City. Her performance was called the "concert's real head turner" by the New York Times.

Cont'd from p.1 ... In addition to caring for research animals, Dr. Lang ran a VIP veterinary clinic. He treated President Kennedy's dog Pushinka, (Russian for "Fluffy"), a gift from Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev to Caroline Kennedy. Pushinka was one of the first Soviet space dogs who returned to Earth. She was brought to Walter Reed by an entourage of the Secret Service, examined, frisked for hidden poison or transmitters, x-rayed, and cleared to be welcomed into the Kennedy family. Later, Caroline Kennedy's Welsh Terrier Charlie arrived by limousine with the usual Secret Service escort for treatment at Walter Reed. Dr. Lang also treated the pets of various Kennedy cabinet members, including the Dalmatians belonging to the Assistant Secretary of Defense.

A decision to make caring for animals used in research a career led Dr. Lang to Wake Forest University in 1963, after his stint in the Army ended. He met the woman he would marry during a blind date arranged by one of Sylvia's St. Andrews classmates, Shirley Reynolds Hutchens, who was working as a med tech in Dr. Lang's department at Wake Forest.

Sylvia accepted a teaching position in Winston-Salem after graduating from St. Andrews. In three years of teaching elementary school, she taught lst, 3rd and 5th graders. When she met Max Lang, her roommates in the garage apartment where she lived were two other St. Andrews alumna— now **Betty Ruth Barker Wilkerson** and **Jerrie Johnson Greene**. According to Dr. Lang, Sylvia Smith was not too anxious to meet this veterinarian who was a "Northerner." They were married in January of 1965.

The Langs moved to Hershey, PA in June of 1966 when Dr. Lang accepted the position as Chair of Comparative Medicine. At the same time he was the first faculty appointment in the new College of Medicine of The Milton S. Hershey Medical Center at Pennsylvania State University. Since both he and Sylvia had grown up on farms, they found a tract of land and built a home there. Their three children, Karen, John, and Susan, were all born in Hershey.

Sylvia was active in many medical center and community activities, taught Sunday School, and was an elder at Derry Presbyterian Church. Her outlook on life was typified by her support of Dr. Lang, however, she did not hesitate to exert her own opinions, leadership and guidance.



The lecture in Belk Main Lounge will follow dinner at 6:00 p.m. Please join us if you are in the area.



Highland Players Reunion at Alumni Weekend

On Saturday of Alumni Weekend 2014, part of our celebration of the Humanities will be a reunion of members of the Highland Players, the drama club which had its origins at Flora Macdonald College and was continued when St. Andrews opened in 1961.

In the first few years of the school, there were as many as 100 members of the Highland Players. Many of those students were honor members. To qualify for membership at that time, a student had to work 40 hours in the Theater department, with 10 of those being outside of acting. To be an honor member, a student had to work 120 hours in the department over 3 consecutive semesters.

Dr. Arthur McDonald was hired for the 1962-1963 school year to head up the Theater Arts department. The first production ever performed at St. Andrews was *Our Town*, in 1962. Other highlights from the 1960s include *Arsenic and Old Lace, The Fantasticks, The Boy Friend* and *Waiting for Godot*.



McDonald went on to serve the longest tenure in theater at St. Andrews; he left in 1983 to chair the Division of Fine Arts at the College of Charleston. Over the years, many alumni who studied under McDonald have expressed their gratitude for his guidance and teaching. Two notable graduates from the '60s are **William Amos Abrams** of Raleigh, NC and **Saax Bradbury** of New Bern, NC, both of whom graduated in 1965.

Mr. Abrams went on to receive a MFA from the Yale School of Drama in 1968. During his professional career he worked as both an actor and a casting director on and off Broadway. His Broadway credits include casting Angela Lansbury in the revival of *Gypsy* (London & New York), *Saturday, Sunday and Monday*, and *Seven Brides for Seven Brothers*. He worked with Barry M. Brown, Fritz Holt, and was later the associate producer for RKO/Nederlander Productions. In 1986, Amos passed away after a brave battle with cancer. At the time of his death, he was serving as Director of Road Resources for the League of American Theatres and Producers. Abrams bequeathed over 680 records of musicals, memorabilia and autographed books and posters to St. Andrews.

After graduating from St. Andrews, Saax Bradbury received an MFA in acting from The Neighborhood Playhouse in New York City. She also performed in many regional and off-Broadway theaters, including the National Shakespeare Company. On Broadway, Bradbury was Angela Lansbury's stand-in for the New York City revival of *Gypsy*; she was an understudy in *Saturday, Sunday and Monday*; and was Dustin Hoffman's assistant in *All Over Town*. Arthur Laurents, the playwright of *Gypsy*, funded her studies at London's Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts. ... Cont'd on page 9

In Memoriam

Florence Dendy Hellekson, who taught Business at both Presbyterian Junior College and St. Andrews Presbyterian College, died April 8, 2013. She was 94.

Edith Womble Boland '42 died on February 14, 2014. A native of Scotland County, NC, she graduated from Flora Macdonald College with an Education degree. She taught school in Oakboro, Gibson, Aberdeen, Red Springs, Charlotte, Fort Bragg, Fayetteville, Maxton and Laurinburg, as well as in Salzburg, Austria and Baumholder, Germany.

Mary Margaret "Peggy" Harris Cleveland '47 passed away on January 30, 2014 in Charlotte. Dr. Cleveland held a B.A. from Flora Macdonald College and an honorary doctorate from St. Andrews Presbyterian College. In her later years, Peggy described herself as a "global feminist", and was particularly concerned with the role of women in the production and distribution of food. She developed a small-scale organic farm and researched the links between hunger and the methods used in large-scale agriculture. She also worked for acceptance of LGBT people in society, especially in the church.

Ada Austin Johnson '53 died on January 5, 2014. Dr. Johnson was a professor of Spanish and French at several colleges and the head of the foreign language department at Charleston Southern University.

Barbara Lifrage Tomlinson '54 died on January 15, 2014 in Kingstree, SC. After attending Flora Macdonald College, she received a Master's of Education from the University of South Carolina. She was a retired elementary school teacher.

Mary Jane Martin '57 passed away on May 24, 2013 in Reidsville, NC. She taught elementary school for nearly 30 years, and retired in 1993.

Toula Yeapanis Van Hooser '65 died on February 18, 2014. Born in 1943 on Cyprus, she taught for 40 years in Alexandria, VA and in Laurinburg, NC.

John Franklin "Frank" Ligon '69 died suddenly of natural causes on December 18, 2013 at his home in Rocky Mount, NC.

Margaret Anne Ligon '72, sister of Frank Ligon, died on January 6, 2014 at her home in Wendell, NC.

The St. Andrews community extends its sympathy to **Judi Lawson Wallace '68**, **Jim Lawson '72** and **Jack Lawson '74** at the death of their mother, Doris Lawson Lewis.

The St. Andrews community was deeply saddened to learn of the death of Helen Sherrill Gustafson on December 24, 2013 at Scotia Village here in Laurinburg. She was 84. A memorial service was held on January 2 at Scotia Village.

Mrs. Gustafson was an alumna of the Class of 1951 of Flora Macdonald College, and received a Master's Degree in religious education from Duke University. She taught math at both FMC and St. Andrews. Mrs. Gustafson also started the gifted program for Scotland County, the first in the state. She was a much-loved and influential teacher to numerous Flora Macdonald and St. Andrews alumni.

Cont'd from p.6 ... When she returned to the United States, Laurents had written *The Turning Point*, a major motion picture which starred Anne Bancroft and Shirley MacLaine, and Bradbury accepted a part in that movie. She died in 1976 when a private airplane she was traveling in crashed.

In 1977, the Saax Bradbury Fellowship was established through the efforts of her friend and colleague, Amos Abrams. Each year it awards two theatrically trained students with the opportunity to attend the summer Drama Workshop at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art in London.

In 1987, The Amos Abrams Scholarship was established. It was created by many of Abrams's friends in his memory and in appreciation for the opportunities created for St. Andrews students through the Saax Bradbury Fellowship. This scholarship is awarded to an upperclassman interested in pursuing a theatrical career.

In the late 1960s and into the 1970s, productions at St. Andrews began to include musicals. Shows included *West Side Story*, *Mame*, and the first production of *Cabaret*. St. Andrews would go on to do productions of *Cabaret* two more times in its history (another was performed in 1985 and the most recent in 2011).

In the 1970s a number of talented faculty members joined the department to work with Dr. McDonald. Dub Narramore served as Assistant Professor of Speech and Theater in the early 1970s, leaving his position at St. Andrews in 1975. He was followed by John Carson, who taught at St. Andrews from 1974 to 1976. A year later, Brad Ford was hired as an Associate Professor of Theater. He remained in the department until 1982.

A notable graduate from this era is **Susan Russell**, who graduated in 1979. She then went on to graduate from the MA/PhD program in theater studies at Florida State University. She was a professional actor on and off-Broadway as well as in regional theater and opera companies across the country. She performed for five years in *Phantom of the Opera*. She has also written several plays in her career, two of which have been produced at Lincoln Center. Russell is currently an associate professor in the School of Theatre at Pennsylvania State University in State College, PA. She has just been named Penn State Laureate for the 2014-15 academic year.

With McDonald's departure in 1983, the theater program was then led by a number of gifted teachers over the next 20 years. Notable productions during this period included plays such as *Equus, The Diary of Anne Frank, The Glass Menagerie* and *The Zoo Story*, as wells as musicals providing a balance of diverse shows.

Since 2000, full-stage productions and student-directed plays have remained a staple of the theater program. In the fall of 2013, the Theater Arts major was replaced by a Communications major that is more focused on public relations and journalism. However, there remains an ongoing and creative theater program led by Visiting Professor Chris Woods who teaches one theater course each semester, and directs 4 plays a year.

Last spring, a capital campaign to fund a two-part renovation of the Morris Morgan Theater was launched. The first phase of this project, spearheaded by alumni **Joe Mitchell '69** and **Johnny McNair '77**, and supported by dozens of former Highland Players, has resulted in major upgrades to the electrical system, lighting and sound systems, as well as modest renovations to the work and storage areas behind the stage. The second phase of the renovation will make improvements to the stage, house seating, sound booth, and additional areas behind the stage.

The theater program has been a vibrant part of the St. Andrews community for the past 50 years. We hope you will help continue this rich and creative tradition that benefits not only University students and staff, but alumni and the Laurinburg community.
